Missing and Child Exploitation (MACE) 1 meeting Information for parents

What is MACE 1?

It is where Senior Managers from many services, hear what is happening for your child when they are outside the home and make sure that the plan is as supportive as it can be to reduce harm.

What does this mean?

- The managers will talk about the Risk in the Community plan.
- The allocated worker's understanding of what is happening for your son/daughter.
- When they are out of the home, what are the worries, where the harm may be happening?
- Who is able to help reduce the harm and who is best to work with your son/daughter, family?
- What is going well at home and out of the home, that can be supported to increase their safety.
- Agreeing the plan made for your child at the RIC meeting so they can ensure this is the best plan possible for your child and your family.

Who attends MACE 1?

Before the meeting

The allocated worker will share with her manager the plan from the Risk in the Community Meeting. The worries will be given in clear, easy to explain language, so they understand your story and can share it with managers.

Other people who come to the meeting will the Managers of professionals who may work with your child and they will already have know the plan. They can also bring any updates since the RIC meeting.

Who does what in the meeting?

The attendees will share the information from your child's plan and their understanding of your child's story. Questions may be asked by other professionals if they do not understand.

Everyone in the meeting is expected to respect each other, talk openly about safety and worries and come together to agree the plan that will reduce the harm and risk and increase strength and safety for your son/daughter when they are out of your home.

After the meeting - what happens?

After the meeting, if everyone agrees that everything is being done by all services to provide support that aims to reduce the impact and harm of what is happening for your son/daughter, then the plan will be reviewed again in three months to look at what has changed for your family.
